**“Colorado Historic Newspapers”**, presented by Jim Duncan from the Colorado State Library, for the Swedish Genealogical Society of Colorado. Colorado's Historic Newspaper Collection is a searchable online database that includes Colorado's earliest historic newspapers. The collection includes more than 140 newspaper titles and 550,000 digitized pages. Selected early years of the Rocky Mountain News, Boulder Camera, Colorado Chieftain are also available online. The digital collection covers 1859 – 1941 for selected newspapers, and represents 56 cities and 38 counties across Colorado.

Researchers can:

- leaf through an issue page by page
- search the database by topic
- look at an individual article by itself or as part of the full page
- search through articles, graphics, letters to the editor and ads
- search a single newspaper, a group of papers, or all papers

This six-year-old service is managed by the Colorado State Library in collaboration with the Colorado Historical Society.

Sitting alongside, and linked to the newspaper collection, is a new “community web site” where individuals interested in Colorado historic newspapers can ask questions directly of CHNC staff in an open and transparent venue, can interact with one another, report problems, suggest ideas and give praise.

**“When All Else Fails, Try the Local Newspaper”**, presented by Roger Dudley, for the Longmont Genealogical Society. Why did our ancestors move or seemingly disappear without any trace? Maybe your ancestor can't be located in a census record or county record, but if your ancestor lived in a town that had a newspaper, you may be surprised to find that your ancestors may have had several articles written about them. Roger is a Denver native who graduated from West Denver High School, Mesa College, and the University of Northern Colorado. After working in video production for most of his adult life he went back to school to get a masters degree in library science. Hired as an archivist before graduating, he discovered that he had been a librarian all his life – he just didn't know it!
